What is an educational fellowship?

- → An educational opportunity
- \rightarrow usually oriented towards an extra-institutional experience
- \rightarrow Funded by
 - Global societies: ESMO, ASCO, AACR
 - Organ-oriented societies/groups: BIG, IASLC, etc
 - National bodies: SEOM, AIOM, SFC, etc
- → With multiple potential formats











Educational Fellowships

Palliative Care Fellowship	An important facet of oncology: easing the physical and mental suffering of cancer patients. Fellows spend an intensive period of observation and/or research at one of the ESMO Designated Centers of Integrated Oncology and Palliative Care. <u>More details</u>	3 months
Clinical Unit Visits	This 6 week fellowship offers young oncologists the opportunity to gain insight into clinical research at a leading European center of excellence. <u>More details</u>	
Translational Research Unit Visit	Three-day visit to the Christie NHS Foundation Trust on the topic: Lost in Translation - how to find your way. More details	3 days

Clinical Research Fellowships	Provide young oncologists with valuable training in clinical research in renowned European cancer centers and support efforts to expand professional networks through collaboration with institutions of excellence. • You get to meet KOL, they will remember the best fellows but also the dilettantes !




Educational fellowship objectives

 - → Translational research (molecular biology, bioinformatics, etc)
 - → Basic Science
 - \rightarrow Clinical trials
- Create a network
- Benchmark your Institution and practice with the best practice/organization in top-notch Cancer Centers
- Define your ambition and objectives for the next 5 years
- Find a new job/position



Weighing the balance





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Mentorship is key

"a dynamic reciprocal relationship environment between an advanced career incumbent (mentor) and a beginner (protégé), aimed at promoting the development of both"

- Qualities of a good mentor
 - → Expert
 - → Interested
 - → Committed
 - → Selfless (when appropriate)





- Finding the right mentor
 - → Speak to colleagues
 - → Look at past publication record of mentorship
 - → Contact prior fellows



Prepare optimally your fellowship

- Define your primary goal
- Speak to older colleagues and mentors about best Institutions
- Polish your curriculum vitae
- Write a statement of motivation
- Look for funding sources
 - → National societies, ESMO, ASCO YIA/CDA, Susan G. Komen, etc
- ✤ <u>START</u> the process early (>1 year)



Be an outstanding fellow

- Define what projects you want to be involved in early on
 - \rightarrow own ideas & hypotheses
 - → Identify mentors -- one person may not be able to meet all of your needs
- Accept criticism and learn from your mistakes
- Be enthusiastic, be patient, and be flexible
- Be proactive, volunteer and efficient
- ♦ Work hard read, read, read, & write, write, write!
 → One time in your life with no patient commitment!
